It makes sense since a puppy or young dog is often too boisterous for an elderly owner to control and with an older dog you know what you are getting. They are quieter, more settled in character and temperament, and of course they won't get any bigger.

Since Chappie had been the companion of an old woman, we felt she would be better rehomed in a similar situation with a single person or an older family. She would be too stressed in a family with lots of young kids, for example.

One day a man came saying that his father, who lived by himself, wanted a dog. He was still very active and had plenty of time on his hands. Since his wife and his old dog had passed away, he was very lonely. The son and his family lived only a few doors down the street so he would take responsibility and care for the dog should anything happen to his father. The next day he brought his father to look for a dog. From several possible dogs, he liked Chappie. They fell for each other and it seemed the perfect match. Everyone was very happy that Chappie had found such a nice home.

Within a couple of days the son reappeared with his father and Chappie. They had to give her back, he said. What was wrong? Nothing was wrong with the dog at all, his father loved her and was so happy, it was just.....then the whole story came out. It turned out he lived with his wife and her father. That spiteful old man said that if anything happened to Chappie's owner, he wouldn't allow the dog in his house.
