# Mother's Pelt Under Offer

Norway, Sweden and Denmark will cut back their mink production. Last season's offering at the auction is was 15 % higher than last year's. All of these 2.5 million mink were breeding animals. Theoretically 10 million less mink will be bred and killed in the 1990-1991 season. Finland is expected to go through the same changes.

China has also slashed its production of mink. The number of mink born annually on Chinese fur farms is estimated around 5 million. At the April auction in Hong Kong however, only one million pelts from female mink were offered, almost 500,000 more than previous years. This means a slash in production of about 2 million animals in the coming winter.

### Cut in Pro-Fur Promotions

The International Fur Trade Federation collected only 2.7 million last year through the 0.4% levy on auction purchases. The previous year it was 3.5 million US\$.. The money is distributed among 15 countries on a matching-fund basis. These countries are the main consumer countries. Japan, also a main consumer is still to be able to cope on it's own. The main countries that recieve international support to save their fur trade are:

They claimed that the showing of the film "Let Them Live", produced by CADAP and Bellerive Foundation in Geneva and distributed by WSPA, had caused them a lot of damage. The Paris court however stated that one should be free to express opinions and give information about fur and to promote alternatives. It was the third time the French Fur Trade Federation tried to use the court to protect their trade. It was also the third time they failed. Some people never learn.
