

Gangs steal terrier pets for fights to the death

DISTURBING evidence of criminal behaviour and cruelty to animals has been uncovered by an *Observer* inquiry into pit bull terriers — the 'killer dogs' responsible for vicious attacks on people.

Criminal gangs are snatching family pets as bait for pit bull terriers training for fights. Hundreds of animals are suffering horrendous deaths trapped in cages attached to treadmills on which fighter dogs exercise. The lure of live bait drives the killer dogs to exhaustion, at which point they are rewarded with the live animal.

The gangs are also stealing dogs, mainly Staffordshire bull terriers, to use in training fights. In the Bolton area of Lancashire over 20 dogs have disappeared in recent weeks. Most die in the fights but a few, horribly mutilated, are abandoned, often on motorways.

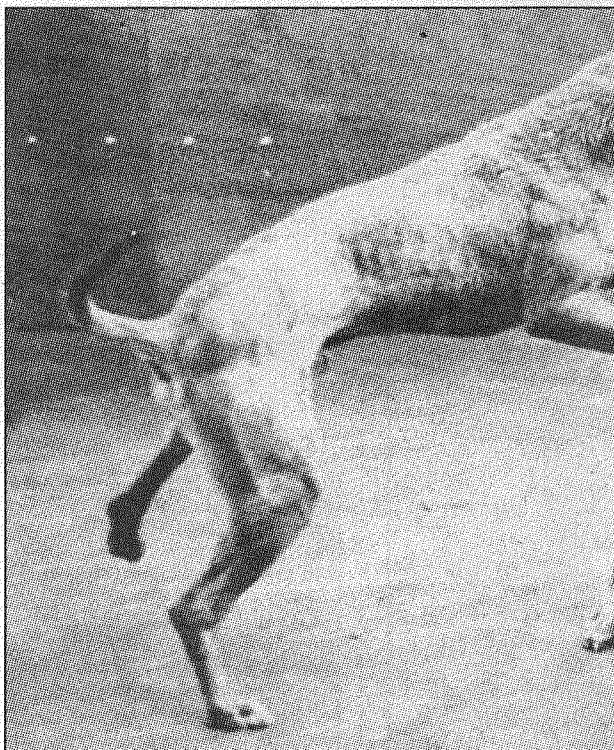
Mrs Barbara Green, who runs a dog rescue scheme in Lancashire, said the situation

was 'a nightmare' and that white dogs were particularly at risk because they 'show up the blood more'.

Animal welfare groups and Labour MPs are stepping up their campaign for tough laws to control pit bull terriers — a breed unknown in this country 10 years ago. Last week Mark Love, RSPCA legal officer, called for the humane destruction of all pit bulls in Britain.

John Bryant of the League Against Cruel Sports says a child will soon be killed. 'Pit bull terriers have no place in society. Ten years ago the Government was warned not to allow them in but ignored us. They must act before people die.'

Two weeks ago a Lincoln baker, Frank Tempest, was savaged for more than 30 minutes by two pit bull terriers. Tim Milward, consultant plastic surgeon at Leicester Royal Infirmary, who performed emergency surgery, backed the call for action: 'These dogs set about removing parts of his face

bit by bit. He is going through a tough time at the moment because he is beginning to realise what he looks like.

'That is hell. These dogs, whose only purpose in life is to kill other dogs, should not be classified as pets. They are wild animals.'

Dr Roger Mugford, an animal psychologist who counts the Queen's corgis among his patients, warned that any parents keeping a pit bull terrier as a pet were putting their children at risk. 'Pit bulls have been developed for one purpose and that is to give sadistic pleasure

to unstable people seeking entertainment of a dog fight.'

Dog fighting has existed in Britain for centuries but a few years ago was thought to have died out. With the resurgence of the pit bull terriers in the United States, and subsequent breeding in Britain, the practice has mushroomed with fights every week.

Two 'underground' journals, *Pit Bull News* and *Sport Periodical*, print results of fights and advertise dogs for sale. The recent edition of *Pit Bull* carried advice on first-aid and 'performance' dogs who
