PLIGHT OF ANIMAL EARTHQUAKE VICTIMS

PET DOGS BEING SOLD FOR FOOD AND TO LABORATORIES

FEARS THAT MANY WILL BE POISONED

Hundreds of thousands of pets have been left starving and injured in the wake of the Kobe earthquake in Japan - and do a are being sold for food and to laboratories for experiments according to international Fund for Animal Welfare (IFAW).

An IFAW emergency relief team is coordinating animal rescue efforts amongst the rubble with feeding programs, veterin y work and lost and found

Amnemieke Roell, IFAW's emergency relief program organiser, seid: "Every day hundreds of pets are being euthanised in shelters. Our ation has a 'no-killy policy which is why we are desperately trying to where we can put up temporary buildings to house the animals.

"Obviously there is tremendous human suffering here but these animals have to be cared for too. Many ate injured and starving, all are traumatised. Thousands of dogs have run up into the mountains."

Under the Government's rabies prevention regulations stray dogs are put down after just three days. IFAW has set up a communications network petween the five sanctuaries involved in the animal rescue work to reunice owners with their pets as quickly as possible.

'Some people have handed their pets to us because they have no lone and no vay to care for them. Other people are living with their animals in nakeshift tents and in cars. We are supplying sem with pet food, " said lizabeth Oliver, who is working with IFAW at her private animal sanctuary called Animal Refuge Kansai - an hour's drive from Kobe.

'Animals are eating garbage in the rubble but it is full of glass. thy our food deliveries are so important. Around 100 volunteers are ravelling around to collect animals but it is extremely difficult as most oads are impassable. We have about 150 animals at the moment but will be ble to care for around 500 when our new buildings are complete. If we can et more land then we will be able to do more. Sadiy, we're only able to ackle the tip of the iceberg, " said Elizabeth.

We know that some unscrupulous people at the dog pounds are sell ig dogs or human consumption and to laboratories. They get about 500 yen (\$5) per og. It is a sick and distressing trade. With the earthquake is going o get worse as more and more strays are taken to the local government ounds. Now our main fear is that the authorities will put down poison to ill off the strays because of the risk of disease."
