Anyone who has been watching NHK or reading the newspapers over the past few weeks will be well aware of both the enormous human suffering caused by the Hanshin earthquake and the widespread destruction of homes, highways and other infrastruction. Kobe and the surrounding area. Not surprisingly, the quake has also been bad new for decats and other animals, many of whom have survived the initial destruction only to be left to fend for themselves in its chaotic aftermath. However, the situation is not all gloom and doom. Some people are hard at work trying to rescue and care for the earthquake's non-human victims. We asked KTO regular and director of Animal Refuge Kansai (ARK) Elizabeth Oliver what is being done and what more needs to be done to help Kobe's animal refugees.

Can you give the readers a rough idea of the scale of animal suffering in the aftermath of the earthquake?

It's impossible to give precise figures for the numbers of animals affected, but on the basis of the data we have I'd estimate that there are somewhere around 250,000 dogs and 500,000 cats in the Kobe and Hanshinkan areas. Of course, the majority of these are

Feral animals survive at normal times and are not the main problem in the wake of the earthquake. Of major concern at this time are the thousands of family pets and other ke_ animals that have run away from home or have lost their homes and keepers. Many of these animals lack the skills needed to survive on the street or in the woods and have been severely traumatized by their experiences.
