Anyone who has been watching NHK or reading the newspapers over the past few weeks will be well aware of both the enormous human suffering caused by the Hanshin earthquake and the widespread destruction of homes, highways and other infrastructure in Kobe and the surrounding area. Not surprisingly, the quake has also been bad news for dogs, cats and other animals, many of whom have survived the initial destruction only to be left to fend for themselves in its chaotic aftermath.
